PERFECT DAY...UNTIL

My friend and I decided to ride our two mares from Crabtree to Chewing gum lake. This ride is a bit challenging as it is steep and often very rocky. But it's beautiful and your reward is the opportunity to swim in a clean, clear, cool mountain lake.

Sherryl's mare, Shona, in spite of only a year of mountain riding, was extremely sure footed as we climbed up rocks and over logs, stopping only to drink from a tiny stream and to catch our breath. My beautiful Morgan mare, Chica, has learned to safely navigate rough trails after years of challenging rides. She no longer leaps over all the scary stuff. Much easier on this old lady.

We arrived at Chewing Gum lake around 11 am. I hobbled Chica and Sherryl let Shona loose to graze in the green grass along a beautiful inlet while we ate lunch.

Then, swimming! We stripped to our underwear and jumped in, heavenly! Sherryl, a strong swimmer, beat me to shore. She decided to swim Shona,

removed her saddle and led her to a small log, intending to jump on.



I asked if she wanted a leg up, but it was too late. I heard the crack across the inlet, Sherryl fell to the ground screaming "I broke my leg."

I rushed over, barefoot, still in my underwear. It was awful, you could see a dent right underneath her left knee. Not good.

I screamed for help, but we were alone. What to do? We had nothing, a few Advil, no jackets, no way to make a splint. I tried calling 911, but could not get service.

After a short while, that felt like eternity, a young man came and stayed with Sheryl, as I got dressed. She stopped screaming and I thought she was in less pain, but she had passed out. Because she was lying in the shallows of the lake, he tried to drag her into dry land while patting her face and saying "Stay with us".

We saw more campers across the small lake and called them over. One had a satellite phone and was able to text 911. We were not sure if the call went through. There was no way Sherryl could ride out. They said "We will not leave her" and sent me back down the mountain to get help at Aspen Pack station.

I saddled Shona, and started leading, sometimes dragging her back down the steep, rocky trail. It took almost two hours as she did well most of the time, but would stop at really scary stuff. I had to ride Chica to the bottom, tie her, hike back and convince Shona to cowgirl up and follow me down.

I got to the trailer, loaded both mares and drove as quickly as possible to Aspen.

They called on their land line and discovered the Satellite call had gone through and a helicopter was on the way. Relief!

Sherryl was airlifted to Sonora where they operated to stabilize the break. She's now in rehab in Modesto with a 6 to 8 week recovery.

Horse people are crazy. When her doctor asked "What outcome do you want?" Sherryl replied "Ride my horse."

Lessons from this horrific accident.

Bring a basic first aid kit! Sherryl's break was too severe for her to be able to ride out, but it would have been great to have a splint or even vet wrap to improvise a splint out of sticks to stabilize her leg. Also it did rain and a poncho was needed.

There's a free app for your mobile phone called Zoleo. It allows your phone to text 911 via satellite. It also pinpoints your location. You'll be able to exchange messages up to 950 characters, and you'll get messages. Zoleo also sells a subscription-based device to use in conjunction with the app or in case you don't carry a phone. If your phone (or Bluetooth connection) dies, the ZOLEO device will still function (SOS, check-ins, location sharing) by using buttons on the unit.

Strongly consider purchasing the PHI emergency airlift service. Individual cost (with health insurance) is \$40. Cost without insurance is \$100. You can obtain the group rate of \$40 a year through Backcountry Horsemen or Pine Mountain Lake. PHICares.com.

covers our region. One-year membership for groups and seniors (60 years and older) is \$65. Standard membership is \$85.

One hour long, it encapsulates wilderness emergency treatment. Well worth watching.

First aid kits are available for sale on Amazon and at most outdoors and sports stores. Below is a backpacker version from REI. Most sportsmen first aid kits include bandaids, gloves, scissors, tape, wound pads, ointments, and an ace bandage. Add your own items, like an emergency blanket, flexible splint, safety pins, vet wrap, and Benadryl.





THE ABSOLUTELY ESSENTIAL FIRST AID KIT

Wound Care:

- -gloves: to protect yourself
- condoms/baggies: to clean wounds, carry water
- -10 4x4 gauze: to put pressure on bleeding wounds
- -band aids

Medications:

- tylenol, ibuprofen: pain control
- -benadryl: bee stings

*Miscellaneous

- -14 G IV catheter: pneumothorax, cricothyroidotomy, wound cleaning -knife
- tweezers: remove splinters
- -safety pins: for everything
- duct tape: for everything
- -iodine/chlorine tablets: clean water
- -para cord
- garbage bag
- -crazy glue


